The Community Planning Lab is a course designed for Summit County residents, community leaders, business owners, and other community stakeholders who want to be more engaged in and better understand processes that drive local planning and land use policy decisions. The course aims to empower community members to be more involved in shaping the future of Summit County.

The course will begin by reviewing planning history, including the impacts of planning policy in and around Summit County. We will then cover a core curriculum including zoning, public processes and how to make an impact, urban design principles, transportation, affordable housing, sustainable development, and finance.

By the end of the course, participants will better understand civic processes, feel more confident in getting involved in those processes, and be prepared to help to shape the future of their own communities and Summit County as a whole.

Required activities for the course include: (1) in-class presentations by experts from the planning field; (2) in-class activities & pre- class readings; (3) virtual or in person attendance at Snyderville Basin PC, Eastern Summit County PC and County Council meeting; (4) a final project.
